PUBLIC PORTION FOR AGENDA ITEMS ONLY:

Councilman Gandy motioned to open the public portion on agenda items only. Councilman Tolomeo seconded the motion, which passed with all members present voting in favor in a voice vote.

John Gentless, 111 Union Ave. Mr. Gentless asked is Juneteenth will be a holiday in 2022. Mr. Bray stated the resolution being considered amended the 2021 holiday schedule. Mr. Bray stated the 2022 holiday schedule has not been set. Mr. Gentless asked if the salvaged vehicle can be used by the fire company. Mr. Bray stated the vehicle is being designated as salvage to allow the fire company to use it in drills. Mr. Gentless asked has the Berlin Road Redevelopment project property been sold. Mr. Keenan stated the Borough has no information on a transfer of ownership. Mr. Keenan stated the project is anticipated to be marketed for sale to a builder once certain site improvements are completed. Mr. Gentless asked what are the boundaries of the proposed redevelopment area. Mr. Keenan stated it is Block 52 on the Borough tax map bounded by the White Horse Pike, Arlington Avenue, Berlin Road and New Road. Mr. Gentless asked when was it decided and where home owners notified. Mr. Keenan stated a subcommittee of Council decide to continue down Berlin Road with redevelopment. Mr. Platt stated this is the start of a public process and it is premature to notice property owners. Mr. Platt stated while the study includes this area it may find not all of the area meets the standard for redevelopment. Mr. Platt stated the condemnation provisions do not need to be invoked.

There were no further comments.

Councilwoman Hall motioned to close the public portion for agenda items. Councilman Kelly seconded the motion, which passed with all members present voting in favor in a voice vote.

POLICE REPORT:

Chief of Police Ronald Morello provided the following information:

- Sept. 1 Attempted criminal sexual contact at Jefferson Hospital, 32-year-old man from Somerdale attempted to grope staff at the hospital. The suspect was arrested and charged. Chief Morello stated the suspect was arrested 9 days later and charged with assaulting a police officer after punching out a window at Applebee's and struggling with police at the scene.
- Sept. 4 Officer injured when a DUI suspect bit them on the shoulder and later bit a Somerdale officer on their ankle. The 30-year-old suspect from Lindenwold was charged with drunken driving and aggravated assault.
- Sept. 5 Driver lost control of their vehicle on Longwood Ave, striking a tree and causing the vehicle to flip over. The suspect was charged with reckless driving and driving while suspended.
- Sept. 10 DWI Checkpoint on White Horse Pike with Somerdale Police. 55-year-old Lindenwold man was stopped and subsequently resisted arrest and assaulted police officers. The suspect was charged with drunken driving, resisting arrest and assaulting officers.
- Sept. 11 Suspect broke into Del Buono's Bakery and stole a small amount of cash. Police identified the suspect via surveillance video. The 35-year-old resident of Stratford Court Apartments was charged with burglary.
- Sept. 19 21-year-old Camden Man was stopped for driver 75 miles an hour on Warwick Road in front of John Paul II School. The suspect was charged with being a fugitive from justice and possessing a stolen vehicle.
- Sept. 20 Suspect charged with shoplifting \$400 of health and beauty product from CVS. The suspect was found at the Time Horton site pretending to be a worker. The suspect has been arrested 30 times for shoplifting in 18 months.
- Sept. 21 A 45-year-old man believed to be homeless man stole at \$4,500 piece of hospital equipment. Neither the suspect or the equipment has been located.
- Sept. 24 Officers found an overdose victim at the Burger King drive thru. Officers administered Narcan the 40-year-old homeless man survived.

- Oct 3. \$900 bicycle stolen from a juvenile eating at D'Amico's. After reviewing surveillance video, a 19-year-old Somerdale man was arrested, charged and the bicycle was recovered.
- Oct 9 Man peering into the widows of an apartment at Sterling Arms. Police responded and learned it is a domestic situation. Police charged a 40-year-old man from Bellmawr with invasion of privacy and burglary.
- Oct. 14 Patient stole \$40,000 worth of medical equipment from Jefferson Hospital. A 55-year-old Camden man was charged with theft and the property was recovered.

Mr. Reilly stated the Kirkwood and Central Ave Phase I and Greentree Road projects are almost ready to go out to bid with construction now anticipated to begin in spring 2022.
